Did you Know?

The Bridgemates have a function which allows you to correct scores if you make a mistake.


In the current round only, and while all four players are at the table, you can correct a score which you all agree is incorrect. **After the Bridgemate shows the next round, it is too late and you must call the director who will access the device with a PIN number.**

To correct a score within the current round:

Press button under ‘Scores’ (bottom right hand side of screen) *All scores played so far will appear*



Press Correct’ key



Enter the board number to be corrected, say, 21 shown here.

Board number 21 is erased and awaits re-input.
Re-enter the correct score and have E/W player check as per usual

When not to finesse

One of the first types of card play we all learned was the finesse, a very common way of handling card combinations. I have noticed that inexperienced players often use the finesse when it is not appropriate. Sometimes it is preferable to give up a trick deliberately instead of taking the option of a 50% finesse. An example turned up in a club duplicate last week, and not everyone found the correct line.

Playing in NT, declarer was faced with this combination of Clubs.

North
♣QJ1098763

South
♣A5

finessing situation in Clubs, some players felt obliged to enter dummy and lead the Club Queen, which lost to the King in the West hand. Now the Club suit was **blocked** and there was no entry to the established tricks. It was essential to play the Ace first, to get it out of the way. An additional factor was that with 10 Clubs between the 2 hands, the King could be singleton. As well, if East holds the Club King, they should not cover the Queen if it is led, as the suit will still be blocked if South plays the 5.
