FROM THE PRESIDENT

My few words this month have nothing to do with Bridge or the Club.

On Good Friday my wife and I were out visiting family about midday when we received a phone call from one of our neighbours who said that our solar panels were on fire! We got home about ten minutes later to find a fire truck in our driveway and fire officers on our roof putting out the fire! Fortunately the neighbours saw the fire and called Triple Zero. The fire did not get into the roof cavity, so the only damage we suffered was one solar panel with a hole in it and there was a large lump of melted glass, metal and plastic on our tile roof.

The fire officer explained that they have attended a number of similar fires. Apparently some panels de-laminate, moisture gets in and sparks start to arc across the gap. The resultant fire burnt through the fire resistant backing of the panel and burnt the plastic wiring underneath.

I tell you my personal story only to alert you to this potential danger. I suggest that you keep an eye on your solar panels and get them inspected from time to time. Our panels were less than six years old.

IMPROVE YOU BRIDGE

Opening Leads

When defending, the choice of opening lead may make all the difference between allowing a contract to make or to be defeated. It is also one of the most difficult decisions that the defender must make. With many hands it is important not to **give a trick away.** For instance, say you have bid a suit, partner has raised it, and you hold AQ10987 in this suit. Do not lead this suit, because there is no guarantee that partner has the King. If declarer has the King, you have given a trick away. Declarer can never make the King, unless you lead this suit. Sometimes it is better to make a completely negative lead, for instance from 3 small cards, hoping to find an entry in your partner's hand.

A point to remember also, is when declarer has shown a very strong hand; do not lead away from any Honour in your hand. Again, make a negative lead.

I am continually surprised at the reluctance of some players to open 1NT with 15-18 points, if they have a small doubleton in one suit. You do not need honours in every suit, in fact a 1NT opening bid only **promises 4 tricks.** (E.g., 4 Aces)
