PRESIDENT'S REPORT

We've now completed the GNOT rounds and the Doris Kerr pairs competition. We have mustered three teams who can go to the next GNOT elimination round in late August. Congratulations to the Doris Kerr winners. (p.2).

The next major event in the club calendar is a Pairs Congress for under 500 master points and under 100 Novices. At least, we hope it will be a major event. Entries have been a bit slow coming in. It's no longer enough to distribute an advertising flyer to attract players to come to a congress. Jane Whelan, the principal Congress Convener, and I have been in contact with clubs in the Brisbane to Gold Coast area to try and drum up support. We hope our efforts don't prove fruitless. We would certainly like to see more of our members taking part. It would be helping the club and can usually provide some interesting games against people who have different systems or styles of play.

More events are coming up, with the Winter Teams list accepting names already for the competition later this month.

People come to our club both to socialise and compete. This is a game - no sheep stations, no life-or-death situation. Everyone likes to have an enjoyable day, so please bear that in mind when at the table. There have been several instances of breaking the rules - some relate to bidding, system ID and alerting.

There is supposed to be at least one System Card for every pair, so please make sure you have a card set up.

If you're having difficulty setting up your card, then approach one of the directors or experienced players for help.

It is mandatory that non-conforming or inappropriate actions are resolved at the time. If there's a problem, call the Director! There is no point raising an issue afterwards - whether it's several tables later or several days.

Lastly, when you play it's a good idea to watch what your opponents do, and particularly observe whether they make any mistakes in bidding or play. Learning from the mistakes of others is a smart move. None of us are going to live long enough to make all of the possible mistakes ourselves.

BRIDGE TOPIC OF THE MONTH

SYSTEM CARDS

System details are to be recorded on approved ABF System Cards. They must be legible to anybody and show the names of the relevant pair and an indication of the classification of the system.

For ordinary weekly Club events, each pair must have at least one relevant system card on the table during a session.

For Club Championships, Red point events and Congresses, each participating pair must have two identical cards on the table throughout the event.

Players who fail to meet these obligations may be required, by the Chief Director, to follow a very simple bidding system, specified by the Chief Director/Director, for the remainder of the session.

WHEN DO I SHOW A FIVE CARD SUIT

It is confusing for the up-andcoming player as to whether their bid shows a five-card suit or a four-card suit. Consider the following auctions. Does 'Your' bid

promise a 5-card suit or only four?

1. North You South West

1♥ 1♠/2♣/2♦

An *overcall* promises a 5-card suit and if at the two level, it would be nice if you had six!

2. <u>North</u> <u>East</u> <u>You</u> <u>West</u>
1♣ 1♦ 1♥/1♠

South's bid of $1 \checkmark$ or $1 \spadesuit$ promises 4+. They are bidding the same way they would have, had East passed instead of overcalling $1 \diamondsuit$.

Note: An opening bid of one of a suit promises length but not necessarily strength in the suit bid. Whereas an over-call tends to promise strength in the suit as well as the required length. An overcall is lead directional.

3. North <u>East</u> <u>You</u> <u>West</u>
1♠ pass 2♣/2♦

Both 2♣ and 2♠ promises a 4-card suit and 10+ points. This allows responder to let opener know they have 10+ points and is forward going.

Anomaly

4. North East You West

1♠ pass 2♥

Here South promises a 5+ card heart suit. With only a 4-card heart suit you can bid something else for now, and do not worry about missing out on a 4-4 heart fit. Partner, who has already promised 5 spades, will bid hearts at her second bid if she has 4+ hearts, so the 4-4 heart fit will be uncovered.

W opens 1♠ and you should respond 2♠ (forcing) with the East hand. Now W will bid 2♥ and the heart fit has been revealed. This is why a 2♥ response to a 1♠ opening bid should have 5+ hearts.

Note: A one-level response to an opening suit bid promises 6+ points and only a 4-card suit. (Bid four cards 'Up the Line'). A two-level response to an opening suit-bid promises 10+ points and only a 4-card suit, unless it is a major suit, then it promises 5+ cards.

5. North East You West

2♣ pass 2♥/2♠/3♣/3♦

A positive response to a strong 2♣ opening bid promises 5+ cards in the bid suit.

6. <u>You</u> <u>East</u> <u>South</u> <u>West</u>
2♣ pass *2♦

2♥/2♠/3♣/3♦

* Negative or waiting bid

When you open $2\frac{4}{5}$, your next bid requires 5+ cards in any new suit you bid.

Note: After a 2♣ opening bid, the first 'real bid' by either player promises 5+ cards in the bid suit.

7. <u>You</u> <u>East</u> <u>South</u> <u>West</u>
1♠ pass 2♦
3♣

The 2♦ bid by South promises 10+ points and 4+ diamonds. 3♣ is opener's second suit and promises a minimum of 4-cards. (1♠ is your 'Primary Suit' 3♣ is your 'Secondary Suit').

8. <u>North</u> <u>East</u> <u>South</u> <u>You</u> 1♠ dbl. 2♥

The 2♥ bid in this sequence is in response to partner's take-out double and thus promises only a 4-card suit. Partner's take-out double implies that she has four hearts as well as tolerance for clubs and diamonds. She is asking you for your preferred suit with an emphasis on the major(s).

9. North East South You
1♠ 2♣ pass 2♦

The 2 ♦ bid is a response to partner's overcall of 2 ♣ but it does promise a 5-card suit as this is a competitive auction and 2 ♦ can be the final contract so you had better have at least five!

Knowing when you promise a 5-card suit and when you can expect a f-card suit from partner gives confidence to your partnership as well as more accurate bidding.

Chorizo Cheese Puffs

1 cup (150g) self-raising flour ½ cup (125ml) water 2 eggs

2 (340g) chorizo sausages, finely chopped (partly cook before chopping)

1 small red capsicum (150g), finely chopped

½ cup (40g) parmesan cheese

3 cloves garlic, crushed

¼ cup finely chopped fresh chives

2 teaspoons cumin

oil

Combine all ingredients, heat oil, drop tablespoons of mixture into hot oil until browned. Makes 40
