BRIDGE TOPIC OF THE MONTH

QUESTIONS DURING THE AUCTION

- During the auction, at your turn to bid, you may ask questions about any part of the opponent's auction.
 It is unwise to ask about a specific part of the auction, as this may convey unauthorised information to your partner.
- 2. It is prudent not to ask questions unless the answer affects your call. Showing seemly unwarranted interest in an opponent's call, particularly an alerted one, may pass unauthorised information to partner.

EXPLANATIONS AFTER THE AUCTION

- 1. At the conclusion of the auction, the Declarer should offer the opponents an explanation of any unusual bidding sequences in their auction, especially self-alerting calls (e.g., doubles, cue bids) that may have an unexpected meaning.
- 2. In any event, it is a good policy for the player on lead to request a full explanation of the auction before choosing their opening lead.

NEW MINOR FORCING

It is good to know that when you freely rebid a suit (you bid it twice) without support from partner, you should have a 6-card suit! On these auctions:

<u>Partner</u>	<u>You</u>		
1♦	1♠	You promise at least 4 spades.	
2♣	2♠	Now you promise 6+ spades!	
<u>Partner</u>	<u>You</u>		
1•	1♥	Both the 1♦ and 1♥ bids promise 4-cards.	
2♦	2♥	Both rebids (◆2 and 2♥) promise 6+-cards.	

This begs the question: How will partner know if I have a 5-card suit? Consider the following auction:

<u>Partner</u>	<u>You</u>
♠ A2	♠ 64
▼ A104	♥ KQJ86
♦ KQ1073	♦ J64
♣ J63	♣ AQ2
<u>Partner</u>	<u>You</u>
1♦	1♥
1NT	?

The minute partner opens the bidding 1♦ you know you have the values for game. So, you bid 1♥ and begin the search for the best spot to play. When partner rebids 1NT, you know she does not have 4-card heart support (or a 4-card spade suit). However, partner might have 3-card heart support and with your 2 small spades, perhaps 4♥ is a better contract than 3NT.

There are several issues with rebidding your hearts. Firstly, if you were to bid 2♥ or even 3♥, opener can pass. Secondly of course, you would be promising a 6-card suit which you do not have.

That is one way you can find a 5-3 major suit fit!
