Alerting

When playing in a Duplicate session at any affiliated Bridge Club, you are playing under the umbrella of the QBA (Queensland Bridge Association). In turn, the QBA is under the umbrella of the ABF (Australian Bridge Federation) as well as the worldwide family of contract bridge players.

You are playing a complicated game that has its own rules, (earning Master Points for those who are interested) and it is a courtesy to other players to try to play within those rules.

A comparatively recent rule is that any conventional bid must be alerted, really as a courtesy to one's opponents. A conventional bid is one that **does not mean what it says.** Players often ask whether an opening 2 Clubs should be alerted. As it rarely means Clubs, but conveys a specific message, 2 **Clubs must be alerted,** as also must a response of 2 Diamonds be alerted. Do not explain the meaning of 2 Diamonds in this sequence unless asked. In fact, do not announce what any alerted bid means unless you are asked its meaning.

Recently a player at our table did not alert a transfer bid of 2 diamonds after she had opened 1 No Trump. This was brought to her attention, and she said "You know what it means!" My partner and I were stunned. Not only was it wrong, as not everyone plays transfers, but arrogant, and a blatant disregard of the rules.

In addition to not alerting, some players are very slack about stating the strength of their 1 No Trump opening bid.

Please, try to be as courteous as possible, and stick to the rules while indulging in our favourite pastime.


