PRESIDENT'S REPORT

We've now completed the GNOT rounds and Carradine has tallied up the Winter eclectics. Those of you who competed will have observed a different movement for the GNOT. The Whist movement is very old. When there is a limited field and an odd number of teams, it can be simple to set up, and only needs a single set of boards. It still allows every team to compete against all others. We are mustering three teams who can go to the next GNOT elimination round in late August. Congratulations to those who competed in the GNOT. (see p.3).

The next major event in the club calendar is a Pairs Congress for under 500 master points and under 100 Novices. At least, we hope it will be a major event. Entries have been somewhat slow coming in with only 23 pairs at the time of writing. It's no longer enough to distribute an advertising flyer to attract players to come to a congress. Jane Whelan, the principal Congress Convener, and I have been in contact with clubs in the Brisbane to Gold Coast area to try and drum up support. We hope our efforts don't prove fruitless. We would certainly like to see more of our members taking part. It would be helping the club and can usually provide some interesting games against people who have different systems or styles of play. We've also arranged a working bee to spruce up the outside area so that visitors can see a clean and tidy area rather than a collection of weeds and dead shrubs.

More events are coming up, with the Winter Teams accepting names already for the competition later this month. People come to our club both to socialise and compete. This is a game - no sheep stations, no life-or-death situation. Everyone likes to have an enjoyable day,

so please bear that in mind when at the table. There have been several instances of breaking the rules — some relate to bidding, system ID and alerting.

There is supposed to be at least one System Card for every pair, so please make sure you have a card set up. If you're having difficulty setting up your card, then approach one of the directors or experienced players for help. We also have some beginners who are making their first attempts at competition play. We try to make it easy for them by giving a "New Player" badge. If you see someone with one of these, then please welcome them and make it as easy as you can for their first steps. Speaking of badges, I've heard that some people have lost the magnetic bar from their name badge. The club has purchased several replacements, and these are available at cost.

Lastly, when you play it's a good idea to watch what your opponents do, and particularly observe whether they make any mistakes in bidding or play. Learning from the mistakes of others is a smart move. None of us is going to live long enough to make all of the possible mistakes

BRIDGE TOPIC OF THE MONTH

HESITATION

- 1. Hesitation is not an infraction in itself. An infraction occurs when their partner is influenced by the hesitation in the action they take.
- 2. Hesitation generally reduces the options available to partner. They may not take any action that is suggested by the hesitation where other logical alternatives to that action exist.

INSUFFICIENT BIDS

- 1. It is never in a player's interest to:
 - a) alter an insufficient bid before the Director has advised them of their options.
 - b) announce to the table what they meant to write.
- Many insufficient bids can be corrected without further redress once the Director has assessed the situation.

1NT RESPONSES

This is a brief description of the Standard responses to partner's opening bid of 1NT. It is designed to find a major suit fit (should one exist) and to answer 2 questions:

What In? and How High?

Responder's First Bid

- 2♣ Stayman asking for a 4-card major (with 9+ points).
- 2♦ Transfer to 2♥, showing 5+ hearts any strength (even 0 points). The 1NT opener must bid 2♥. Responder can now pass with 0-8 pts, or invite with 9-ish or bid game with 10-15 pts, or explore slam with 16+ pts.

Say you hold: ♠ 62 ♥ J108764 ♦ 932 ♣ 54. This hand is a real dog. But the two questions What In? and How High? still needs answering.

Q: How High? A: Part-score. Q: What In? A: Hearts.

So, in response to 1NT, bid 2♦ (transfer to hearts) and when partner bids 2♥, you can now pass.

2♥ will almost certainly play better than 1NT!

- 2♥ Transfer to 2♠, showing 5+ spades and any strength. The 1NT opener must bid 2♠.
- 2NT Invitational to 3NT, showing about 9-ish type points with no 4-card or 5-card major. Holding
 - ♣ Q86 ♥ K103 ♦ J1063 ♣ QJ9, I would bid 2NT in response to partner's 1NT opening bid.
- 3♣/3♦Invitational to 3NT, showing a 6-card suit with 2 of the top 3 honours, and nothing else.

eg. ♠ 8 ♥ 743 ♦ AQ9732 ♣ 875.

By responding 3♦ to partner's 1NT opening bid – you are saying: "I have 6 diamonds headed by two of the top 3 honours". Yes, you only have 6HCP, but if opener has the ♦K, the diamond suit could be a source of 6 tricks, and she will bid 3NT. If she doesn't have the ♦K (only 2 or 3 small diamonds), she will pass and let you play in 3♦.

- 4♣ Gerber asking opener how many aces they hold.
- 4NT Invitational to opener to bid 6NT if they hold a maximum hand pass with a minimum.

The GNOT Qualifying Rounds were contested by eleven teams who completed over two weeks on 14th and 21st 16th June.

The winning team was Jenny Boxer, Peter Neville, Pam Rupin and Carmel Denero.

In second place was Philip Thompson, Brian Gamble, Agnes Kempthorne and Barry Kempthorne, and in third place was Molly O'Donohue, Gill Ross, Michael Souter and Loren Leader.

Three teams will represent our club in the GNOT Finals for the Brisbane zone in August.

BRIDGE BOOK REVIEW

Introduction to Bridge by Paul Marston

The challenge of bridge is to communicate with your partner in a way that is unambiguous. A bid is an undertaking on behalf of the partnership to make a certain number of tricks. A bid is also the only way to communicate to your partner the strength and shape of your hand. Your bid and you partner's responses must have very set and well understood point ranges for the auction to be successful. Paul Marston's Introduction to Bridge teaches those exact point ranges.

This book covers such important topics:

- Exact point ranges for every level of bidding
- Responding at the correct point level
- The difference between high card points and total or distributional points.
- Reassessing your hand once you have a fit
- What to bid when you don't have a fit
- The basics of when to double
- Tips on card play

The fastest way forward in mastering this challenging game is for BOTH you and your partner to understand each other. It is unproductive for only one partner to know and understand the valuable information in this book. Study it together.

Paul Marsden is a very successful bridge player with more than 50 national and international titles to his credit. He runs the Grand Slam Bridge Centre in Sydney and also has many useful YouTube videos online.
