## PRESIDENT'S REPORT

In contrast with last year, the election of the committee at this year's AGM was a non-event. There were exactly the number of nominations required to fill every position, so all nominees are now on the committee. I would like to thank all who endorsed me to continue in the role of President. I hope that the committee will be a constructive and harmonious one.

The main issues that had to be dealt with at the AGM were several motions that had been placed on notice for the required time ahead of the meeting. All of these were passed by show of hands, although not all were accepted unanimously.

Meanwhile, we can now get back to concentrate on the main purpose of the club, which is to enjoy playing the game that gives us both pleasure and frustration.

The new Committee is as follows: Nigel Cleminson (President), Mike Souter (Vice President), Colin Gorton (Treasurer), Jane Whelan (Secretary), Avra Bowler, Gabriel Ruhland, Turgut Manli, Tom France, Max Latimer and Tala Badie, and we are already in action.

One change that was endorsed at the AGM was approval for a paid non-playing director for significant club events such as honour board and similar. We are still operating with only three qualified directors at the club. It may be necessary to revert to a single director for ordinary sessions and have two directors for significant events. If anyone is able to assist with directing, even on an occasional basis then we would appreciate your help. The President's Pairs annual competition was held last month over two Wednesdays. We had twenty pairs eventually, after a couple of late additions and late withdrawals. This was run as an eight-round Swiss competition. Brian Gamble and Loren Leader worked their way to the top early on and weren't dislodged. Congratulations to both of them.

There have been some after-effects of the power outage that followed Cyclone Alfred. There are battery backups for the alarm system and for the emergency lighting that enables people to evacuate the building in an emergency. The alarm system has become inoperable, so we'll have to look at installing a new one. Two of the emergency lights failed the legal illumination duration, so they'll also need replacing. The other item that failed recently is the session timer on the Eastern wall. We are considering a new system with a couple of large TV screens, similar to those used in other clubs to replace the countdown timer.

Beginners' classes started last month at the usual time of 2-4 pm on Wednesdays. The first lesson was supposed to be on the 5<sup>th</sup> of March, but with the after-effects of the cyclone it was postponed a week. The classes go for six weeks, followed by supervised play.

We have several red point events lined up in the near future. These include the Doris Kerr this month and the Marie Currell Novice Trophy next month, as well as various eclectics. You may remember that a named ANZAC Day pairs event was run for the first time last year. A new perpetual shield has been donated by Turgut Manli, and this red point event will be held later in the month. Good luck to all of you playing in these events.

May your finesses work at least half the time.

### One No Trump Response by Partner

We are always asking ourselves two questions on any auction. How High? What in? Asking ourselves these two questions keeps us focused. If

we can answer these two questions, we will often land in the correct contract.

#### 1**.** - 1NT

1NT shows 3-3-3-4 shape. With a 4-card suit above clubs she would have bid it. So, she has a 4-card club suit ie. ♠ J 7 5 ♥9 7 3 ♦ K 8 3 ♣ A 10 7 3. If she had 5+ clubs, she could have bid 2♣ instead of 1NT.

#### 1 🔶 - 1NT

Denies 4-hearts or 4-spades, but she could have long clubs. i.e. ♠8 2 ♥3 ♦J 8 3 ♣K Q 8 7 4 3 2.

#### 1**V** - 1NT

Denies heart support or 4+ spades, but she could have long diamonds or clubs.

#### 1**.** - 1NT

Denies spade support, but she could have long hearts, long diamonds or long clubs!

In all the cases above, the reason responder did not bid their long suit is because they had less than 10 points. If you have a hand where you have to add your length points to get your way up to 10 points, it might be best to respond 1NT for now, (limiting your hand) and then bid the long suit at your next opportunity.

### An interesting hand:

North ▲A97542 ♥AK3 ◆AK3 ♣7 South ▲83 ♥J10986 ◆J83 ♣A85

- 1. North opens 1 (nice hand worth 19-20 points).
- 2. South holding 6+ points must respond and bids 1NT.
- Opener wants to be in game and must make a forcing bid that responder cannot pass. She can't rebid spades. 2▲ shows a 6-card spade suit but limits her hand to minimum strength (13-15) and can be passed. 3▲ is a jump but limits her hand to medium strength (16-18) and can be passed. She can't jump to 4▲ as South has not promised any spades. 3NT is not viable as she cannot see partner's hand.

- 4. A jump shift is forcing to game, hence 3♣, 3♦ or 3♥ would be forcing which suggests holding a 4+ suit which opener does not have. They are all fibs. A 3♣ bid is out of the question, so it has to be either 3♦ or 3♥. You may have heard the phrase *"if you have to fib, don't fib in the majors."* So, the correct bid here is 3♦ with the aim of dealing with whatever responder responds.
- 5. Bridge is not a perfect game, especially when it comes to the bidding. However, we can only do what we think is best. Here we are feeling our way in the dark a bit. Our focus at this point is on making a forcing bid. 3 ◆ leaves open the chance for responder to reveal more about her hand. She might now bid 3 ♥ to show a 5+ card heart suit. That would be nice. Or she might bid 3 ▲ showing simple preference, showing 2-card spade support. We could deal with that! If she raises diamonds to the 4-level, oh dear, it was not what we're hoping for, but we can now counter with a 4 ♣ bid to tell partner we have six.
- As it happens, Responder does bid 3♥ showing 5+ hearts. We now have the answer to the question: What in? Answer: Hearts. How High? Game. So - we can now bid 4♥. Whew!

## BRIDGE TOPIC OF THE MONTH

### DECEPTION

- You cannot attempt to deceive an opponent except in your bids and cards played.
- This includes things like deliberating for a few seconds before playing a singleton to make an opponent think you have a choice of cards to play or hesitating when an opponent is finessing through you in order to make them think you have the missing honour.
- Bridge is not poker bluffing is not allowed!

#### WHEN IS A CARD PLAYED?

- For a Defender, a card is played when it could have been seen by their partner. It doesn't matter whether or not partner did see it, nor does it matter if Declarer saw it.
- For Declarer, a card is played when it is placed on or near the table in the played position. It doesn't matter whether or not a Defender has seen it.


